Dear Perkins Family,

The COVID-19 Pandemic continues to impact our daily lives. However, the pandemic has not stopped the momentum that has begun with the redevelopment of Perkins Homes. We have relocated families from Block A and most of the families from Block B. Because of unforeseen circumstances we have had to expedite the relocation of our remaining residents and have made great strides in doing so. Although we have not relocated all of our families our team continues to pursue the goal of relocating all of the Perkins families as soon as humanly possible.



We are on our way of accomplishing many of our goals and objectives for the PSO Transformation Plan. The TIF was signed by the Mayor and is now law.

The Finance Department has begun the process of getting the bonds issued so we can began using those funds for the public infrastructure that is required for the PSO project area.

IMPROVING EDUCATION PROVIDED USI WITH 16 BEDTIME IN A BOX THIS YEAR

In each box, there was a reading/counting learning kit, books, pajamas, toothbrush, toothpaste, a stuffed animal, and a bath time kit. Over the next year, families will receive 4 kits (every three months), and 8 books (on the off months). This provides USI an in-person touchpoint with families over the year, especially now that they have moved throughout Baltimore City. This will also help us learn how to better support parents and drive better outcomes with students. Education Specialist Subira Brown, is working hard

to find ways to encourage fun learning for children in Perkins from ages 3-5 years old. Our goal is that youth begin kindergarten ready to learn on gradelevel!

As the boxes were being delivered to our office, parents were excited to see what was in the boxes. A few of the moms asked for additional boxes for some of their other children to support reading. Before partners were able to reach all the homes, one receiving parent sent pictures of her son playing with the items in the box. #EducationPillar

THE TRANSITION TO YOUNG ADULTHOOD – GRADUATE, FIRST TIME VOTER & CAREER EXPLORATION

Congratulations go out to Mr. Demetric Witherspoon, a 19-year old original Perkins Homes Resident! Demetric is a 2020 high school graduate of the prestigious Baltimore "City" College High School. He wanted to initially attend Coppin State University but ran into some enrollment challenges. USI began to work with Demetric in hopes of streamlining the college enrollment process for him. Demetric has decided to pursue a degree in Nursing! In Spring 2021, he will begin his first year as an undergraduate college student - 100% tuition FREE! According to the Registered Nursing Board, undergraduate education in Maryland ranges from \$34,000-\$50,000 for a nursing degree. Demetric has been working closely with his mentor and USI's student intern Amira Jabbar a senior Social Work major at Morgan State University.

In addition to Mr. Witherspoon pursuing his academic goals, he voted for the first time in his life in this year's 2020 election. Like many young adults, Demetric was skeptical about voting. The mistrust in government and the system as a whole – impacts many residents. He mentioned that he was not



aware of the past events and everything we endured for the ability to vote and have our vote counted.

"It was only 1965 when the 15th amendment was passed which gave us the right to vote. And still we had our right to vote suppressed due to restrictive laws known as Black Codes," Amira informed him. She explained how black people marched, went to prison, and even lost their lives for us to be able to vote.

Demetric responded, "You know what, I'm going to go to Dunbar right now to vote." Demetric did his civil duty and voted that very same day! He was so excited to vote and he said that it felt good. On this day – he made history. There will be much more to come from Mr. Witherspoon in the future... who knows, he may just be one of your registered nurses in the future! #EducationPillar

LIVING CLASSROOMS UPDATE

YOUTH SERVICES

- The POWER House has provided over 65,000 meals since March and continues to serve as a community hub for the Perkins community. The POWER House has continued to serve students daily in a hybrid model, providing homework help, tutoring, and enrichment sessions.
- 21 high school students graduated virtually from our TIZ Summer program. Our team delivered school supplies, notes of encouragement, and important support.
- Bloomberg and Tribeca Films presented a virtual screening to 275 Baltimore Youth on December 4th with short films that address social emotional and racial disparities that plague our youth. Students watched the films and there were panel discussion and a master class in film production for students interested.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

- To date in 2020, Workforce Development at the POWER/UA House has placed 37 individuals into full-time employment, enrolled 74 individuals into skills training courses (PerScholas, GED, Bayview, Pre Apprenticeship Training, and granted 86 industry recognized certifications, which included: A+, Network+, Forklift, OSHA 10, Aerial Lift, Scissor Lift, Site Safety, CPR-First Aid and AED, and Johns Hopkins Contact Tracing. To date, our program has provided referral services to 62 Perkins Residents. During the pandemic, our program has been conducting a monthly Virtual ID Clinic assisting individuals with obtaining his/her birth certificate and social security card.
- The Truist Foundation has provided a generous grant supporting virtual Financial Literacy workshops designed to create an
 understanding of basic banking budgeting, savings, credit and debt reduction for clients, young people enrolled in our programs,
 staff, and the community at large. The goal of these workshops is to provide the community with a creative and
 successful pathway to financial success.
- Building on the last year and successful summer programming, our Bloomberg College/Career Readiness program has secured funding from Bloomberg Philanthropies for \$400,000 to continue to implement LCF Year-round College/Career Readiness program. Over the next year, our program will be working with 15 in-school youth.

Public Safety is vital to the overall success and well-being of the PSO community, and we are committed to ensuring the components of our PSO Public Safety Plan are implemented during all phases of the Transformation Plan: Pre-development, development and post-development. As a group, we will review quarterly PSO crime and safety stats, and strategize with the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice, BPD, the State's Attorney's Office, and various other community partners to plan activities that can be implemented to mitigate risk and reduce crime.


PSO PARKS NORTH CENTRAL PARK AND SOUTH CENTRAL PARK

TRACKING THE PSO TRANSFORMATION PROGRESS


The Baltimore Neighborhood Indicators Alliance (BNIA) at the University of Baltimore has been engaged to develop an online tool to track the progress of the Perkins, Somerset, and Oldtown redevelopment project.

This tool, which is designed for public use by residents and other community stakeholders, tracks progress on several key community statistics for the core goals of the PSO Transformation project: Housing, People, Neighborhoods and Economic Development. The web tracking tool will be updated every quarter going forward for such indicators as the number of units under construction, resident participation in job trainings, residential relocations, various neighborhood conditions such as crime and vacancy, as well as, the types of investment funds coming to the PSO development.



The website uses interactive charts and maps so that users can see and understand the trends and patterns in the data. For example, one of the charts provides data about the type of relocations households have experienced from the PSO footprint. The graphic above shows that more than 30 households relocated in the 4th quarter of 2019 and the majority moved using Section 8 vouchers.

The site also includes many maps, such as the one below that displays the zip codes where many of the households that relocated from the PSO area have moved. The map helps everyone see that 21206, 21213, and 21202 have the highest number of relocated families.



The BNIA team will continue to work with all PSO stakeholders to ensure the website is updated every quarter so that the most up-to-date information is available for residents and other stakeholders. The website can also be updated with new datasets that answer questions that residents have about the project and the trends of the surrounding community.
